JAMES M. BAKER

Corporal, Company "E" 77th Ohio Volunteer Infantry

Died April 13, 1862 at Shiloh, Tennessee of Wounds Received April 8 at Falling Timber

This man has not been positively identified, but in the opinion of this writer, he was likely a son of Henry Baker and Barbara Harter of Marshall County. There was another James M. Baker in Marshall County but he served in the 17th West Virginia Infantry and died in 1910.

At the time of the 1850 census, Henry Baker and his wife, Barbara, resided in Marshall County with their children, Timothy, 11, James M., 7, and Catherine, 6. In 1860, Barbara was not in the home. Mary, 26, might be Henry's new wife with whom he had added a few younger children. The children listed were Timothy, 20, James, 17, Catherine V., 15, Viola J., 6, Alfred, 4, Henry F., 8 months.

James M. Baker's stated age was 19 when he enlisted in Ohio on November 14, 1861 to serve three years. He was promoted to Corporal on December 12, 1861. The following April 25, 1862 news article indicates he died in Tennessee and was from Marshall County, (W) Virginia. His death is confirmed in the *Official Roster of the Soldiers of the State of Ohio in the War of the Rebellion, 1861-1866*.
