## Died April 9, 1862 of Wounds Received April 8 at Falling Timber, Tennessee

This man has not been positively identified, in terms of where he fits into the Marshall County Hubbs family.


Joseph Hubbs' stated age was 42 when he enlisted on June 29, 1861 to serve three years. Following his death at Falling Timber, Tennessee, a news article indicated he was from Moundsville, (W) Virginia.

His widow, Hannah, maiden name Greathouse, per her death record, received a government pension.

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According to Presbyterian Church Records, Hannah Hubbs (spelled Hobbs) married Franklin Wilds, both of Ohio County, West Virginia, on August 12, 1865, in West Alexander, Washington County, Pennsylvania.



The marriage is reflected in the pension records. Franklin F. Wilds had served in Battery "H" 1<sup>st</sup> West Virginia Light Artillery. After his death, Hannah applied for a pension based on his service. She would have relinquished her pension from Joseph Hubbs' service when she remarried.

It is not known if Hannah had children with Hubbs, but at a glance, it appears that she was quite young when she married Joseph Hubbs, and their marriage record hasn't yet been found. After she married Franklin Wilds (also found as Wiles), they had seven children before the 1880 census, at which time they lived in Scioto County, Ohio.

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Hannah Greathouse Hubbs Wilds, born in West Virginia on June 1, 1945, per her death record, died on October 14, 1917 in Pittsburgh, Allegheny County, Pennsylvania. Funeral at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Harry Scheirlein. (This was daughter, Dora.)
