PRIVATE GOOK TELLS OF LIFE IN GERMANY

Is With American Forces in Mountain in Germany—Writes Interesting Letter.

The following letter was written by Private Henry L. Cook of the 13th field artillery supply company, stationed in France, to his sister, Miss Mary Cook

of 10 Pike street, this city:

Dear Sis-Just a few lines to let ; ou know I arrived here O. K. and am teelto call Germany, but the American boys have hold of it now. I was on a trip from Sunday noon till Wednesday evening. I sure did have some time on my way here. We traveled through some of the battlefields and several towns that were blown to pieces. We got off at a couple of places and got to got off at a couple of places and got to look a few things over. I can tell you a lot of things that I can't tell you in my letters. All the boys up here have been on the front, and they sire can tell some stories. Well, Mary, I don't know how long it will be now till I am back. The boys up here think we won't get back till next fall, but if I have to stay that long I am not go. I have to stay that long I am not going to worry about it. We have a nice place here. We are sleeping in houses some places. I start to work Monday. I guess I will get to work in a machine shop. They have little shops on trucks. I have only worked one day since I have been here, and that was out in the woods getting wood to burn in the kitchens, and while I was out there I saw five deer. It sure would be good deer hunting out here. We are located out in the mountains. We rode out here in a truck, and it sure was a nice ride. I saw a palace built up on a blg point and it sure did look swell, and there was a big American flag on the top. Tell all the boys hello. 1 guess it will be a while before I can tell them myself. I expects ma thinks I am never coming home, but tell her not to worry, for I am feeling fine and still as fat as ever. Well, Mary, I guess this will be all for today, so good-bye. Love for all.

Henry L. Cook, 24, and Leona O'Leary, 23, both born in Wheeling, were married in Wheeling on June 25, 1919.
