

THOMAS EDWARD FAGUE JAMIESON

U. S. Army Captain, American Railway Regiment

At the time of his death from heart disease, Captain Jamieson had been newly commissioned Captain of the American Railway Regiment. He had been scheduled to sail for France in five days.

Born in Cumberland, Maryland on January 5, 1876, he was the son of William H. Jamieson, born in Pittsburgh, and Mary Snyder, born in Cumberland.

At the time of the 1900 census, the Jamieson family lived on South Penn Street, Wheeling Island. Mr. Jamieson was employed as a Yardmaster at the railroad. His wife, Mary, had given birth to 3 children, all still living. The children were Thomas E., 25, Harry B., 23, and Mollie H., 19.

On October 17, 1900, Thomas E. F. Jamieson, 26, married Sidney K. List, 24, in Wheeling. At the time of the marriage application, he stated he was residing in Newark, Ohio.

PRETTY WEDDING

Solemnized at the Fourth Street M. E. Church Uniting Two of the City's Popular Young People.

A very pretty wedding was that at the Fourth street M. E. church at 8 o'clock last evening, uniting in the bonds of holy wedlock two of Wheeling's best known young society people. The principals were Miss Sydney Katherine List, the winsome and accomplished daughter of Mr. and Mrs. B. M. List, and Mr. Thomas Fague Jamieson, general yardmaster of the Baltimore & Ohio railway at Newark, Ohio. The ceremony was performed in the presence of a large circle of friends and relatives of the contracting parties. The nuptial knot was tied by the Rev. S. T. Westhafer, pastor of the church. The ushers were Charles List, brother of the bride, Arthur Irwin, Harry Jamieson, brother of the groom, Hadsal Manning and Will Milligan. The bride was presented to the groom at the altar by her brother-in-law, Mr. F. M. Cotton. Miss Jeanette List, sister of the bride, acted as bridesmaid, and Mr. Edward Jamieson, of Pittsburgh, was best man. After the ceremony the happy young couple were driven to the home of the bride, 77 Maryland street, Island, where a reception was held from 8:30 until 11 o'clock. Mr. and Mrs. Jamieson depart to-day for Newark, Ohio, where they will make their home.

In 1910, Thomas and Sidney Jamieson lived in Connellsville Borough, Fayette County, Pennsylvania. Thomas was a Train Dispatcher at a Railroad.

Thomas E. F. Jamieson died in Garrett, DeKalb County, Indiana on March 9, 1918. The cause of death was stated as "Angina Pectoris" - which is a symptom of coronary artery disease.

**SERVICES FOR PROMINENT FORMER
RESIDENT, WHO DIED IN GAR-
RET, IND., SATURDAY.**

**Obsequies For W. E. Chapman, Veteran
Soldier and Popular Citizen,
Held Yesterday.**

The body of Capt. Thomas E. Jamieson of Garrett, Ind. formerly of this city, who passed away Saturday, arrived here yesterday and was taken to the home of E. M. Cotton of 77 Maryland street, from where funeral services will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock. Rev. Jacob Brittingham, pastor of St. Luke's Episcopal church will officiate, assisted by Dr. Clarence E. Allen, of the Fourth street Methodist Episcopal church. Interment will be made private.

Thomas Jamieson was the son of W. H. Jamieson, who was formerly general yardmaster of the Baltimore and Ohio here. He lived here for many years. His death comes as a great shock to his many friends.

Captain Jamieson was due to sail for France Saturday with the American expeditionary troops. He had been commissioned as captain in the American railway regiment only recently.

Mrs. Jamieson his widow, was formerly Miss Sidney List, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. M. List of the Island. Besides his widow he leaves to survive his father, brother Harry B. of Baltimore and one sister, Mrs. Ralph Tuman of Tiffin, Ohio.

Captain Jamieson was trainmaster of the Baltimore and Ohio at Garrett, Ind. for two years, and was one of the most widely known business men of that place. He attended the recent officers' training camp, and his being commissioned as captain was the result of his hard and honest work.

Thomas is buried at Greenwood Cemetery, Wheeling. His wife died in 1948 and she is also buried there.
