
LESTER SCOTT

In his WWI Draft Registration, Lester Scott stated he was born on September 5, 1896 in Graysville, Pennsylvania. He was a farmer for L. E. Fisher at RD #5, Elm Grove, and his address was the same.

Lester's parents were Christopher Scott and Sarah Jane "Jennie" Ewart. At the time of the 1900 census, the mother was deceased (died in 1899) and the family lived in Richhill, Greene County, Pennsylvania. The children were Haddie M., 14, Bearl, 18, Brantly, 10, Minnie P., 8, and Leslie, 4.


In 1910, Christopher Scott was residing at Sand Hill, Marshall County, at which time Lester was "Lesley," age 14. Other children at home were May, 24, Brantley, 18, and Nora, 6.

Lester Scott enlisted on September 22, 1917.

Lester Scott is buried at Mt. View Cemetery, near Dallas, Marshall County.

LESTER SCOTT'S BODY Looked for Today

MEMBER OF PAMOUS SIATE FIELD ABTILLERY WHO WAS KILLED IN MEUSE-ABOOMIE OF-PERSON.

Funeral Arrangements Incomplete Fending Arrival—Former Comrades to Act as Fallbeara's.

The body of Lester Scott, member of the famous 314th Field Artillery, better known as "Wheeling's Own Regiment," is expected to arrive in the city this morning at 10:27 o'clock, and will be taken at once to Crider Bros, undertaking parlors at Elm Grove, Funeral arrangements are incomplete pending arrival, but services will likely be held Sunday afternoon at Dallas Presbyterian church, with Rev. Fred William efficiating, and interment in Dallas cometery.

Scott, on account of his knowledge of horses, was selected as a wagoner, and after eight months in Camp Loo he was sent oversees and on the firing line displayed great courage, going into the most dangerous areas driving a "sime carrying rations to the fighting lads." Scotty," as he was known to all his comrades, was one of the most pepular lads in his unit, and was known as the of the most conscientious boys in the supply company. Death resulted from a sharpnel wound in the chest at the time of the Meuse-Argonne offensive.

Young Scott had a premonition of death, and as he stepped to the gaugplank of the steamer taking the hoys across the ocean he said: "Tols is the last time my foot ever sets on United States soil." This remark was the basis of many discussions both before and after Scott's death.

Surviving the dead sqidler are his father, Christopher Scott, and two sisters, Mrs. James Riggle of Dallas and Mrs. Sam Simms of Roney's Point, and one brother, Burley Scott of Roney's Point.

The local American Legion will hold their ritual over the body and will have general charge of the services, providing pallbearers and a firing squad.

Funeral services were held yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Dallas Presbyterian church, over the body of Lester Scott, wagoner of the 314th field artillery, who met death by a German shell in the Meuse sector. Rev. Fred Scott officiated, and interment took place in the Dallas cemetery. The sorvices were in charge of the American Legion and were conducted according to the Legion ritual.

The deceased was the son of Caristopher Scott of Elm Grove.
