benefit of the third section of the act of Congress of the 4th July
1836 on this 31st day of January - 1837 personally appeared Temperance
Cochran a resident of the County and State of Virginia 27

You are advised that it appears from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, W. 6745, that James Cochran entered the service in October, 1776, as ensign in Captain David Scott's company, Colonel Russell's 15th Virginia Regiment and resigned September 11, 1777.

He was allowed pension on his application executed July 30, 1818, while living in Harrison County, Virginia, aged sixty-seven years.

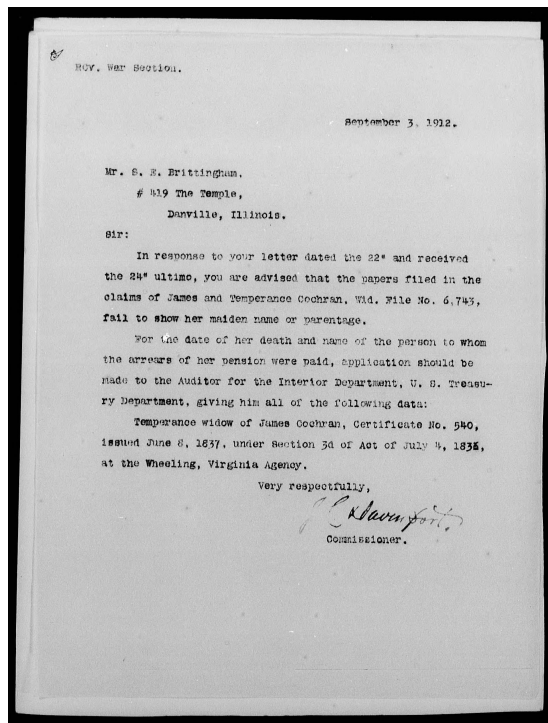
