forty eight years, who says that he is the son of Josephial
and Rebecca Wade deceased of Tyler County, Va. &
that his father the said Josephial, was a Revolutionary
war pensioner of the United States till his
death; that he & the said Rebecca lived as man
& wife, & as such raised a large family of children
of which Josephial was the eighth. That his said
parents both & each of them lived with a great
portion to their death, and that they kept a
family record which account always incident to
from them, was a correct record of the date of their
marriage, the births of their children, that record
has always been confined within or between the lids
of an old fashioned pocket book, such as heretofore
used, just as it was when kept by ^{my parents,} Josephial

Sir, Enclosed I send the Deposition of Nathan Joseph, proving the marriage of Rebecca Wade widow of Nathaniel Wade, who was a soldier of the Revolution and a late Pensioner of the United States.

Mr. Wade filed his declaration for a Pension under the act of 4th July 1838, in the year 1841, at that time, there was living in Monongalia County, Va. two of her late husband's brothers, whose depositions she intended taking to prove her marriage, they having been present - It was delayed for some time however, as she could not then, nor for many months thereafter, send to Monongalia to get them, and the next winter, they both died, within a week or two of each other - This, is the reason why, it has been so long delayed, not knowing where to find witnesses - You will perceive that Nathan Joseph, the witness, was very young, at the time of the marriage, not quite seven years old, but the marriage having taken place at his father's house, there is no doubt, in his recollection it will, as he states that he afterwards continued to be well acquainted with the parties.

As soon as you decide on her application, please let me hear from you.

In a letter I addressed you in February 1841, in relation to the application of Mrs. Margaret Stanton for a Pension under the act of 4th July 1838, there was a proposition to this effect, that if you deemed the proof adduced by Mrs. Stanton insufficient, to establish her marriage prior to 1st January 1783, you settle her to the benefit of the provisions of

the act of 4th July 1836; that then, she was wil-
-ling to take Pension under the act of 7th July 1838.
To this proposition, no answer has been received.
I suppose it to have been overlooked by you, as
the same letter embraced matters relating to other
pensioners, which have been punctually attended to.
Will you be kind enough my dear Sir,
to a very poor family of people (the mother having
died since her application for a Pension) to exam-
-ine Mr Stanlin's declaration & the various
-proofs that accompanied the same, and it is
- hoped that upon a careful examination of the
- same, that if they are not found sufficient to
- establish her marriage before the year 1783,
- that they will be found amply sufficient to es-
- tablish her marriage before the year 1795 &
- entitle her to a pension under the act of July
- 1838 - True the proofs are not precisely the
- kind required by you (viz) Record of the Marriage
- Family Register or Record of the baptism of the
- children - But there is the testimony of two
- witnesses (both credible) one of whom is of the highest
- respectability (Mrs Temperance Cochran) who testifies
- that she knew Patrick Stanlin & his wife Margaret
- some years before the year 1800; at which time
- they were living as husband & wife, and the fact
- of their being so, never questioned; and that, at
- her first acquaintance with them, that their
- oldest child named Nelly, was a young woman.
- She states also, that she had often heard James
- Stanlin, the brother of the said Patrick Stanlin
- tell a laughable anecdote that occurred at the
- wedding of the said Patrick & Margaret, but which
- the said James Stanlin was present in. This part
- of her testimony is corroborated by the Deposi-
- tion of Mrs Bolton, the daughter of the said
- James Stanlin, who told the anecdote; she Mrs
- Bolton states, that she had of her heard both

her father & mother, who were at the wedding
- all of a ludicrous circumstance, that took
- place thereat - - - Mr Nathaniel
- Hunt, testified that he had known them (them
- in 1800) upwards of fifty years, and that they
- lived until the said Patrick's death as
- husband & wife ever since his first acquain-
- tance with them & that he had never heard
- other, than that they were husband & wife, also
- that their oldest daughter named Nelly, with
- whom he had often played when they were
- children, was in his opinion older than
- himself - When these Depositions are
- considered in connection with the Copy of the
- Deed (which is record evidence) executed by
- the said Patrick Stanlin & Margaret his wife
- to Williamson in 1808 for land
- in Harrison County, when they
- sold out & came to this, a very
- strong case is presented, if not to a Pension
- under the act of July 1836, it is believed to
- be irresistible to one, under the act of July 1838
- your particular attention to this applica-
- tion as indeed to all others I present, for
- I would not present a claim if I did not
- truly believe in its justice, is respectfully

On the 11th day of October in the year 1833 personally
appeared before me the undersigned one of the Commissioners
of the peace in and for the said County of Tyler
Hegshick Wade a resident of Fish Creek settlement, in
the said County of Tyler and State of Virginia, aged 49
years, who being first duly sworn according to Law,
did on the oath make the following declaration
in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress,
passed June 4th 1822.

That he entered the service of the United
States under the following name, appearing and acting
as here in stated. That in April 1778 appeared before
me as a private and Indian Spy, in the County of
Augusta Virginia, seven in the County of Monongalia
Virginia, for a period of three months, under Captain
Peter Hays, appeared with some others was placed
at a Post of Buffalo Creek, now in the said County of
Monongalia Virginia was bound by Capt Hays
to spy from the Post on the waters of Buffalo Creek, Dun-
can Creek, Bunganun Creek, Fishing Creek, Little
Creek, and Little Fish Creek, waters principally leading
together, then leading to the Monongalia river, and
the opposite way to the Old River, which the
Indian went upon, as their war parties ran along
said water course, when they intended to make an incursion
upon the frontiers, during said service under
Capt Hays in the month of June a party of the
same was discovered on Fish Creek by some persons
an Indian man by the name of Little who was with
them making their way to Buffalo Post, appeared and
Little hastened to their quarters alarmed the laborers
in their fields working, of the Empire was engaged,

and went into that the discovery apprehended the night before
they were in ambush around the Post the night and day, during
that their appearance was an evening killed one man and
had their departure without doing any more damage
them from the number of the evening it was not considered
necessary to pursue them any further the post being quite much
in favor of number themselves, the above incursions were also
that happened during the service of appeared under Capt
Peter Hays and H. W. discharged in August 1778
having served the service for which he volunteered, by the Capt
Hays. Then in March 1779 appeared was ordered out
as an Indian spy and private by Capt Peter Hays
was stationed at Starbuck Post in Hancock County
in Augusta County then, now in Monongalia
County Virginia, was ordered by said Capt Hays
to spy upon the same waters as he did in the preceding
year having become acquainted with them, namely
Buffalo, Duncan Creek, Bunganun Creek, Fishing Creek,
Little Creek, appeared was not engaged in any personal conflicts
that season, sufficient to say that he was, as an Indian
spy was a Continental for several months, that year
at which time he rec'd a discharge from his Captain Peter
Hays having served eight months, the reason why
appeared was continuing this long was that the discovery was
heard from on the head waters of Monongalia River
and about Post Little John - Blalung new stands, and
Wetump in the Blue River, committing great havoc
and murder. Then in March 1778 appeared volunteered
as a private and Indian spy under Capt Peter Hays
for a period of three months was stationed against
Starbuck Post in Hancock County in Monongalia
County Virginia, where he remained. Capt Hays placed
appeared, or ordered him upon the above named waters of
Buffalo, Duncan, Bunganun, Fishing Creek &c. then in

Shenandoah County Virginia, but now in Harrison Pennsylvania and
of the County Virginia, because of his former acquaintance
with said water, and upon his saying concerning had
discovered the head of a large number of Indians who had
made some time long ago Benjamin Smith in July of this
year, a Band of the Buffs, of the Monongahela River
affiant testified that he had been on Sunday Creek, to
advise the people of what he had discovered, saying
they would not have told if they had not all ready been
there. On the approach to said Fort, the marks of a camp
was obvious. the night preceding the enemy consisting
of one hundred warriors swayed a number of about
twenty five men, a woman, & some corn etc about from
one to two miles from said Starbuck Fort, that the troops
placed them selves in ambush on each side of the trail
leading from them to the Fort, and on the morning of the
lastness to the Fort who had some pork with them killed for
the use of the fort, they were fired on by the troops and
eighteen of their number, were killed dead on the ground
among whom was affiant's Father, Joseph Wade, Isaac
Steadman, Richard Hildinger, James B. Both A. Daniels
etc. the number of the enemy so greatly exceeding those
within Fort, that the Fort was kept closed until times
had passed their destruction, when affiant among others
repaired to the ground upon which the killing had been
committed, and indeed the mangled limbs of those who
fell at the charge of the enemy, nothing of persons in
the morning after that seven affiant was discharged
by his Captains John Lucas, in October 1778, affiant
filling himself as much as possible at the destruction of the
troops, and that at the left of his Father, John Wade in March
1779, for a period of seven months, under Capt.
John Lucas, and an Indian Officer of private intelligence
County Virginia, in Harrison Pennsylvania, was
John Wade, Martin Fort in September 1779 a member
of the Monongahela River, Capt Lucas's Company

of John Wade Indian Officer, upon the same waters
of Buffalo, Benjamin, Hancock, etc. as before men-
tioned by affiant in the County of Harrison, Penn-
sylvania and of the County of Harrison, Virginia was
a Negro, and continued in the month of Novem-
ber in that year at which time he was discharged by his Capt
Lucas, as a white boy, saying that he was necessary to participate
etc. between affiant and the troops. Then in April 1779
Affiant was ordered back by both the Captains of Lewis Town
Company, and placed under the Command of James
-and... Cooper, of the Pennsylvania Militia,
to march to Sandstone, or rather of Monongahela River
as a private, to drive the Indian Enemy from that place, en-
tained in the service under the command of James Cooper one month
and was discharged, then returned from Pennsylvania
to Virginia in Monongahela County, and in April 1779
affiant was drafted for a period of six months, as a pri-
vate under Captain John a brother of the Virginia
Militia, being marched to Fort Pitt a place where
Pittsburg now stands, from thence to Philadelphia the whole
time was stationed at that place for six months, then ordered
the Monongahela River to Proprietors, in Monongahela
County Virginia, and was stationed on Sunday Creek
at Starbuck Fort, and there affiant was discharged as a
privé in Command of said Captain, and spent six weeks in
the County of Harrison Pennsylvania, and after
Virginia sent his term of six months after which he was
drafted back into and he was discharged by Lt. Colonel
Cochran, that he served all not less than 30 months,
and that during the time of his service, he knew the following
names of officers, both the House of Lewis Town, William
-son of Pittsburg (as affiant understood), Band of Pittsburg
and Broadhead of Fort Pitt, Captains, James Day,
John Minor, John Lucas James Cochran, ...
Mellomon of Lewis Town, Pennsylvania, Capt. James
of said County Virginia, John Hanson of Monongahela,
and that the Regiment in his possession that he has so

Bowman in the neighborhood, who can testify as to his
character for bravery, and their belief of his services
as a soldier in the Revolution

of Giles County Virginia a Revolutionary pensioner

she died on the 22nd day of August in the year
1846 leaving the following children Viz. William
Wade, George Wade, Joseph Wade, Hezekiah J. Wade
(deceased) and Rutha Young late Rutha Wade

Madam:

I advise you from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, W.6387, it appears that Heseckiah Wade was born in 1754 in Frederick County, Maryland, and was the son of Joseph.

While a resident of Augusta County, in that part which was later Monongalia County, Virginia, he enlisted and served as a private and Indian Spy with the Virginia Troops as follows:

From April, 1776, three months under Captain Owen Davy; from March, 1777, eight months under Captain John Minor; from March, 1778, six months under Captain John Lucas; during this period his father, Joseph and seventeen other men were killed by the Indians near Fort Stradler; from March, 1779, nine months under Captain John Lucas.

In April, 1780, he enlisted and served one month

as a private and Indian Spy with the Pennsylvania Troops under Lieutenant Cooper.

He enlisted in 1781 and served six months as a private and Indian Spy with the Virginia Troops under Captain James Cochran.

He was allowed pension on his application executed October 11, 1833, while a resident of Fish Creek settlement, Tyler County, Virginia.

He died, November 23, 1834.

The soldier married, June 15, 1785 or 1786, Rebecca Joseph, who was born, October 11, 1769 or 1770. She applied for pension, February 23, 1841, while living in Tyler County, Virginia with her son, Heseckiah Joseph Wade. The claim was allowed.

She died, August 22, 1846, leaving the following children: William, George, Joseph, Heseckiah, Joseph, and Rutha Young.
