On this 19th day of January 1833, Personally
appeared in open Court before Robert Goodell, Kenneth
Bowman, James D. Beckwith and John B. Lacy
Justices of the Peace, constituting the County Court
of the said County of Tyler, State of Virginia, a resident
of the said County of Tyler, State of Virginia, aforesaid,
aged seventy two years, who being duly sworn ac-
cording to law, doth on his oath, make the following
declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the act
of Congress passed June 7th 1832.

That he entered
the service of the United States, under the following named
officers, and served as herein stated, to wit, that in the
year 1776 he resided in Montgomery County, Maryland
that about the 1st of June of the said year, he enlisted
in the service of the United States for Six Months in
what was called the Spring camp, destined for the
Northern service, that he was marched to the State of
New York & belonged to the company commanded by
Capt. Edward Budge, in General Bull's Brigade, and
attached to the Regiment commanded by Colonel Geiger
& Lieut. Col. Keyhook & Major Stanton.

That he was in the Battle of York Island &
the White plains, that he served Six Months the time
for which he enlisted, & was discharged at Philadelphia
about the 1st of December 1776 - that while in the service he
marched, through Pennsylvania & Maryland & there took water
& lodged at the head of Elk & from thence to New Castle,
& Delaware & from thence to Philadelphia, thence to
Hinton - Jersey, thence to the city of New York -
thence to York Island, where he was stationed, until
after the Battle of York Island, or Starlem Heights
took place - thence to the White plains, where he
was until after the battle so named - thence to the
Jerseys, where he was with the army near a month,
thence to Philadelphia, where he was discharged as aforesaid.

That about the year 1780 he removed from Maryland
to Loudon County, Virginia for the year 1781 he was disch^d

for a term of Three Months, was marched to Williamsburg Virginia. That he served in the Company Commanded by Capt James Hammell, belonging to the Regiment Commanded by a Colonel or Lieut Col Hannawater, that he does not recollect the names of any of the Officers of the Regiment, but an Officer called Major Hardman or Hardman, who acted as Adjutant to the Regiment - that he served the term for which he was drafted at Williamsburg in the neighborhood thereof. That he has no recollection whatever of having received a written discharge, at either of the times he was in the service, provided he must, as he swears his true faithfully both times, if he did, they are now lost.

That while in the service of the United States he was acquainted with General Washington, Thomas Greene of Captain grade & Major Stanton in the Army Camp, but from the lapse of time & consequent lapse of memory, he cannot recollect the numbers or names of any Continental or Militia Regiments with which he served. That he was born on the Eastern shore of Maryland, a few miles from Cambridge, this is the day of March 1766 - that his family has a record of his age to which he has access.

That since the Revolutionary war he resided in Loudon County Virginia until the year 1792 in the fall of which year he moved to Brook County Va where he lived some years & from thence, removed to the County of Giles (then Ohio) his present place of residence, where he has ever since continued to reside.

That he is acquainted with the Reverend John Ripley, Thomas Ingram, Thomas Workley, David Hickman & others of his neighborhood, who can testify as to his character for veracity & that he fully believes of his services in the Revolution. He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a Pension or annuity, but still swears & declares that his name is not on the Pension roll of any State. Sworn & subscribed the 14th day of January 1833 Samuel Wheeler

We, John Ripley, a Clergyman, residing in the County of Giles, State of Virginia, and Thomas Ingram, residing in the same County State, hereby certify, that we are well acquainted with Samuel Wheeler, who has subscribed and sworn to the foregoing declaration, that we believe him to be seventy two years of age, that he is reputed and believed in the neighborhood where he resides to have been a soldier of the Revolution, and that we concur in that opinion. Sworn, and subscribed the day & year aforesaid.

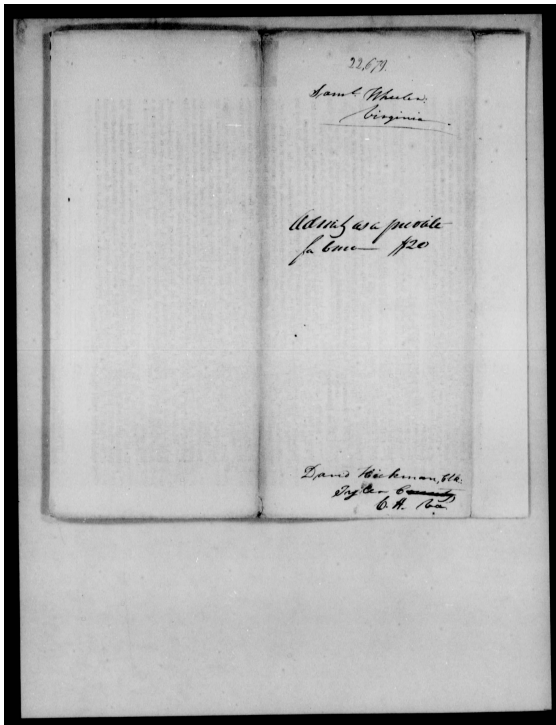

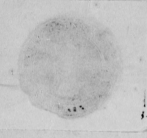

Deposed as follows to wit, that he was acquainted and served with Samuel Wheeler in the Army of the United States in the Revolutionary War, that the Deponent of the said Samuel Wheeler enlisted in the State of Maryland about the first day of June in the year 1776 in what was called the flying camp for the term of six months, that they were marched to the State of New York, & served in Bell's Brigade in the Regiment commanded by Col. Griffin & Lieut. Col. Skyles Major Stanton, that the Deponent belonged to the Company commanded by Capt. Erno Campbell & that the said Samuel Wheeler belongs to the Company commanded by Capt. Lewis Bridges, that they served out the time for which they enlisted & were discharged at Philadelphia about the 1st of December in the year 1776 & further the Deponent said not sworn & subscribed to before me this 16th day of August 1832
